Remembering the Cricket Invasion

It's the beginning of a new year. I thought it might be a good time to reflect on one of the SNU rallies of the past before we head into a new rally season and create new memories.

In August 2005, the SNU held a **rally in Kingston**, **NV** on the property of SNU members, Roy and Bonnie. Kingston is one of those almost ghost towns a little Southeast of Austin, NV in the wide open spaces of the Smokey Val-



ley. This was going to be a special rally for many reasons and it was the first trip for two of our members with their brand new Airstreams. Randy and Vicki had just recently purchased their first Airstream, a 25ft Safari. Jerry and Dyann had recently purchased a new 30ft Classic, the third Airstream they have owned.

Everyone hit the road Thursday on their own schedule anticipating a beautiful, uneventful drive East on Highway 50, known as the loneliest road in America. All was well and good until we began to hit higher elevations near Austin. Then you began to notice brown spots on the road. As the elevation increased the brown spots covered the road – and they were moving! We had hit an infestation of Mormon crickets. As you drove through areas where the road cut through rocks, you could see a moving wall of brown going up the rocks. As you descended to a lower elevation the crickets disappeared only to reappear as you crested the next ridge of hills.

We began to worry. What was the elevation at our rally site? Were we going to be met with millions of crickets? Were we going to have to relocate the rally? Then of course there were our rigs. What about all those bug bodies on our Aluminum Airstreams, especially the new ones? After leaving Austin which is at a little over 6,600 ft, we hit another patch of crickets then as we descended down the valley towards Kingston which is around 5,900 ft. we had left the crickets behind. We drove into our rally site and were relieved to find it cricket free. Jerry & Dyann arrived and like the rest of us, the front end of their brand new Airstream was plastered with a thick layer of brown crickets. Some attempts were made to clean the trailers but this was a dry campsite and also there was the trip home to look forward to.

After yet another, fantastic rally we headed home and faced the crickets. Sure enough, at certain elevations the crickets covered the road. A solid moving brown carpet that included as many dead as live crickets. The road was slippery and since the day was warm the smell was pretty intense. As soon as the Jerry & Dyann arrived home, they got out the power hose. It took four hours to clean off the layers of crickets from the front, the underneath, and various other parts of their new Airstream. Randy & Vicki not only got a thick layer of cricket guts on their new Airstream, crickets also covered the truck that they had just purchased. Randy had to wash everything again the next day to get all the guts off. Then, his driveway was full of cricket guts. So he had to hose off the driveway. As Randy says, "Ah, fond memories."

This unusual initiation for brand new Airstreams didn't dampen spirits or enthusiasm. Both the Thornburg's and the Grossmann's showed up at the next rally with sparkling clean Airstreams and some special memories of their first trip with their new trailers.

The SNU is always looking for content for the newsletters. With advances in technology, there are more options for newsletter content. Rick recently suggested that we could include links to videos. If anyone has a smart phone, camera or other device that records videos, take some video of a really interesting action or event at rallies. Then these can be sent to the SNU and linked into the newsletter for all to watch. There are two methods for sending videos to the SNU. You can post to You Tube first and then send a link to the SNU. This may be the best option because the way You Tube processes the videos they are condensed and formatted in a way that makes them more accessible and easier to upload. Restoration Project

SNU members, Barney and Mary Beth are in the process of completely restoring their 1951 Cruisette. They are working with Sierra Airstream Restoration, in Minden, NV. This photo shows the shell suspended from the ceiling after it has been detached from the frame. Cruisettes were made only in 1951 and 1952. They were marked with serials consecutively form 8000 to 8075 so only 76 were made. This one is 8040 and was made in 1951. You can follow the restoration project on our website or better yet, go see it for yourself. Barney says that if anyone wants to visit our project let him know and he can arrange a visit. The Grid

The power grid connects to your RV using either 30 Amp single phase (120 v) service or 50 Amp split (or two) phase (240v) service. Single phase service is just a high power version of your standard household appliance outlet with three wires. Split phase is often used in houses for 240v appliances such as ovens or clothes dryers and these use four wires. You can count the pins or sockets on the plugs to tell what is 120v single phase or 240v split phase most of the time (there are some 240v connections that don't use 4 pins).



Power voltages are not tightly specified and can vary by ten percent or so. A nominal 117 volt supply can range between 130 and 105 volts. Higher voltages tend to burn out lamps and electronic stuff faster while low voltages tend to burn out motors faster. Why there are such changes has a lot to do with how far the electricity has to travel and the expected loads on the system when it was designed.

In most cases, you can pull the power lead from your RV and just plug it into the camp power pedestal as they will have plugs for both 50 Amps and 30 Amp services. All you do is to match up

the plugs and check that the circuit breakers are closed. It's when the camp power pedestal does not have the same kind of plugs that match those on your RV power cord that you have to be especially careful. There are adapters to handle most plug mismatch situations but the usual circumstance is to reduce the electrical power available to your rig. For instance, the 30 Amp single phase RV plug to a 15 or 20 Amp household plug adapter is perhaps most common but will allow you to use on 15 Amps at a time in your RV rather than 30. The version of this adapter for 50 Amp split phase has additional limitation in that you can't run any of the 240v appliances in your RV.

It is always a good idea to have indicators in your RV to use to make sure you are properly connected. The simplest is only \$5 or so and uses indicator lights to tell you if the wiring is connected properly or not. The next step up tells you the voltage. Volt meters are particularly important when running an air conditioner so you can make sure to turn it off if the voltage goes to low (usually anything below 110v is hard on them.)
