New Directions

The following is from a report of a WBCCI Committee Published January 14, 2009. In reading the suggestions written about Units you will notice that the SNU could have provided inspiration for this report. Many are concepts the SNU created for itself in 2002. When the SNU was struggling, we had to figure out for ourselves what we needed to do to turn things around. We took it upon ourselves to remove barriers. We minimized structure. Rather than be a "cookie cutter" Unit, we focused on who we were, the area we live in and the preferences of the members and potential members in our area to provide direction for the type of Unit we should be. Over the years we have successfully implemented many new and innovative ideas. We have kept accurate records of all aspects of membership including recruiting methods, tenure and participation. The SNU has provided a successful model. Although it has received some recognition, it seems that change, although often encouraged in WBCCI committees and by some individuals, is very difficult to accept and implement. The SNU didn't wait for change to be handed down, it went about creating change for itself.

From: New Directions - A compilation of proposals put together by the WBCCI 2020 Long Range Planning Committee

Focus on the Units, Remove Barriers – The Unit is the heart of WBCCI. The focus of Region and International leadership should be on the Units...identify the kind of help needed by struggling Units, provide assistance when the Unit needs are identified, help identify prospective members, identify what successful Units are doing to get and keep members, assist smaller Units in planning and executing rallies/caravans that then make it easier for smaller Units to recruit officers and encourage joint rallies between smaller Units.

- Too much structure is imposed on the Units that creates a "cookie cutter" look to the Units. Remove barriers that keep Units from thinking outside the box.
- The Units should have the latitude to be innovative and creative in how they are organized and operate, trying new and revolutionary approaches, to promote new ideas and approaches. The approaches that work can be shared with other Units.
- Provide assistance and encouragement for the formation of new Units. Revise and reduce requirements for the formation of a new Unit.
- Member participation in the Units should be emphasized and an "active index" developed that would measure the percentage of members who are actively involved in Unit events,

Airstream Activities

One of the changes is evident in the rising number of Airstream focused groups

Both are open to any brand of RV although it is basically an

Airstream event. As they state in the FAQ "If you aspire to own an Airstream, come on over and check out the people and the product!" These events have great websites with all sorts of good information. Then there are clubs and events open to all brands of RV's like Good Sam, Escapee's, The International Campers Club and Tin Can Tourists to name just a few. There are also smaller informal groups that gather for rallies or similar activities. These may be an offshoot of a WBCCI Unit or subgroup. They may be the work of a few individuals with an idea which they then promote through various means including forums and other social media. If you search around the internet you can find all sorts of information and links that can lead you to activities, events and clubs that relate to Airstreams either directly or indirectly. Although Wally Byam wrote his creed with Airstreams in mind, the ideas he expressed can easily expand to include the wider world of RV'ing. For instance, one statement in the creed is "To open a whole world of new experiences ... a new dimension in enjoyment where travel adventure and good fellowship are your constant companions." That is a pretty good summary of what we all want from our RV'ing experience.

- Bylaws Submission On July 24, 2016 the SNU received an email from the new WBCCI CBL chair requesting we submit our bylaws for review. The email states that needs to be done every five years and that the SNU bylaws hadn't been "reviewed in several years". Apparently the email from the previous CBL committee dated April 4, 2016 acknowledging that the committee had received the SNU bylaws (downloading them from the website) and was in the process of reviewing them had not been passed along to the new committee. The Value of a Good Map

The **Donner Party** is famous because of what happened after it got caught in an early snowstorm on the east side of the Sierras. They were delayed in the journey to California because the guide they hired knew about a shortcut in Utah that turned out to be not really suitable for a wagon train.

The same thing happens today, more than 150 years later. **Death by GPS in desert** illustrates that the guide these days is the maps embedded in GPS navigation units. You will nearly always find these sorts of stories blaming "GPS" when it is really the maps (the guide) people use and the judgment they employ in their travel based on those maps.

"Technology, of course, is not the only denominator to those disasters. Others include poor planning, faulty judgment, bad luck and the lemming-like rush of visitors to Death Valley in the summer, many of them unfamiliar with the danger – making heat-related illness and fatalities nearly as predictable as the searing temperatures."

The GPS is not the only guide that may lead you astray. On a forums discussion an RVer was asking about dispersed camping in the Mojave National Preserve. He got two responses. One said to stick to the established campgrounds and avoid off road camping until he had had a chance to investigate them personally. The other said that there were a lot of places where he could pull off the road for an overnight. It is true that there are many such places but what happens when you find you have left an established road at sundown for a trail with no way to turn around or where the trail rapidly degrades to deep soft sand? How do you know who to trust?

We do have very good maps these days. You can know exactly where you are with a good deal of precision nearly anywhere. Vehicles are incredibly reliable and capable. Search and Rescue teams have tools and techniques (and practice in their use) that give them capabilities to find lost travelers like never before. As the Sacramento Bee article notes, though, there is no substitute for proper preparation and good judgment.
